Role: Black in Cancer Mentee

Black in Cancer is an organisation that aims to strengthen the network between Black people in the cancer space whilst highlighting Black excellence in cancer research and medicine.

The Black in Cancer Mentorship Program 2023-2024 (BiCMP) aims to provide regular career-focused advice and support to Black undergraduate students studying Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths subjects with an interest in joining the fight against cancer.

Upon acceptance into the program, mentees will fulfil a 9 month commitment.

Applications must be submitted via the Black in Cancer application portal by **Monday, 18th September 2023.** Following this date, the Black in Cancer Mentorship and Outreach team will contact selected students for interviews with Black in Cancer board members by the end of October 2023.

Qualifications:

Mentee must be an undergraduate university student in pursuit of an Undergraduate (associate/bachelorette/BSc) or Master's degree. Students should have completed at least one year of university level courses by summer 2023 in order to apply for summer internships facilitated through Black in Cancer. Mentees are expected to be professional, open to learn, and engage with Black in Cancer mentors. Each admitted mentee is **expected** to be responsive to email communication from their mentors and the Black in Cancer Mentorship Team. Three unexcused lapses in communication will result in termination from the Black in Cancer Mentorship Program. Upon acceptance, mentees will need to sign a contract with outlined expectations to be sent to bicmentors@gmail.com two weeks post acceptance.

Time commitment:

Mentees are expected to meet with their mentors for a minimum of one hour per month either virtually (for example, using Zoom, Skype) or face-to-face to provide career-focused guidance.

Duration:

October 2023 - June 2024. Mentees will also be invited to apply for an 8-week summer internship which will take place between June and September 2024. Internship opportunities will be available later in the program and students are welcomed to apply with the help of their mentors.

Duties and Responsibilities:

- Be open, excited and willing to engage your mentor to get the most out of the mentorship experience
- Be cognizant and respectful of your mentor's time
- Take advantage of your mentor's expertise including but not limited to completing job/graduate school applications, CV/resume, interviews, etc.
- Be proactive engage your mentor with your goals and aspirations in mind
- Take part in quarterly group check-ins with other Black in Cancer Mentees
- Support and share Black in Cancer events when possible
- Disclose academic schedule to ensure mentor is aware of exam and deadline periods

Standards of performance:

- You will be representing Black in Cancer and as such are expected to be professional and courteous at all times
- Maintain regular contact with your mentor and the Black in Cancer Mentorship and Outreach team between October 2023 to June 2024.
- Take part in both formal and informal networking and speaking engagements offered through Black in Cancer.

Safeguarding and Student Welfare:

A mentor is <u>NOT</u> expected to act as a therapist. Throughout the course of the relationship both the mentee and mentor have the right to report any safeguarding issues to the Black in Cancer Mentorship and Outreach team (<u>bicmentors@gmail.com</u>).
